



LANDSCAPE CONSTRUCTION and YARD MAINTENANCE WORK



What is the Difference?

A landscape construction professional is an individual who prepares the land, does the planning and installs lawns, shrubs, trees and other nursery stock. The individual also installs water features, irrigation systems, drainage systems, fences, decks, arbors, patios, landscape edging, walkways, driveways and retaining walls. This work, if done for compensation, requires that the person be employed by or own a landscape contracting business that is licensed with the Oregon Landscape Contractors Board (LCB). This business license is in addition to any local business licenses that may be required in your area.



Yard maintenance work is unregulated in Oregon and does not require a license with the state of Oregon (local business license may be required). This work is performed on an existing landscape and includes: mowing, pruning (up to 15 feet from ground), edging, power sweeping, raking, fertilizing, bark dusting and the planting of annuals and perennials in existing beds (limited). The repair of irrigation or drainage systems, the building of retaining walls, or other construction work **is not included**. However, a person doing yard maintenance work can replace existing lawns, trees and shrubs to a limit of \$500.00 per job site per year without obtaining a state license with the Landscape Contractors Board.

SO YOU WANT TO BECOME A LANDSCAPE CONSTRUCTION PROFESSIONAL?

If you are a person who:

- likes to work outside in any weather;
- likes hard physical work,
- likes working with people; and
- may want to someday own your own business (be your own boss),

then this industry has a lot to offer you.



You may not make a lot of money right away but as your experience, knowledge, client base, client relationships and expertise grow your marketability will be enhanced which may, with proper business practices, lead you to your financial goals. Always remember a good business plan is the starting point of any business venture and that the regulation on landscape contracting businesses is very stringent and to some very burdensome. It is not a decision that should be taken lightly.

Remember: people "do not plan to fail, they just fail to plan" (anon)



WHAT IS REQUIRED?

In order to become a landscape construction professional in the state of Oregon you must:

1. **Qualify** to sit for the examination that is given by the Landscape Contractors Board. You qualify by demonstrating experience and/or education in the landscape field. *(after Jan. 1, 2008 there is an exception to this rule for a probationary license. Please contact the LCB after this date for more information.)*

You may qualify if you:

- a. Have two years (24 months) of experience working for a licensed landscape contracting business **or**
 - b. Have at least 48 months of working in a landscape related field such as landscape maintenance **or**
 - c. Have the certified landscape technician (CLT) certification with the Oregon Landscape Contractors Association (OLCA) or Professional Landcare Network (PLANET) **or**
 - d. Have a B.S., B.A., or Associates degree in landscape architecture or other landscape related field which includes a work study element to the degree **or**
 - e. Are an arborist that is licensed with the Construction Contractors Board and have a current ISA certification
2. Once you pass the examination then you will receive your landscape construction professional license. **However,** in order to work in the state of Oregon, you must either be the owner or an employee of a licensed landscape contracting business. The business is the entity that is required to carry the necessary bond (\$3000, \$10,000 or \$15,000 depending on the amount of work), general liability insurance (minimum \$100,000) and worker's compensation if the business has employees. The business is also the only entity the consumer contracts with to do the work on their property.



Things you can do to prepare for this career!

- Learn to get along with others. You may work for and with lots of different and potentially difficult people
- Practice good attendance and punctuality. Your boss and clients expect you to be dependable
- Learn appropriateness (for example: language that you use outside work is not OK with your client)
- Start a lawn mowing service in your neighborhood
- Work for a licensed landscape contracting business. Learn how to run a business and work your way up the "ladder" in that business
- Learn keyboarding and computer skills
- Take college or vocational school classes in business and landscape related areas
- Become a better writer (for bids, letters, bills and contracts)
- Learn to work on your own, meet deadlines and be organized
- Complete a two-year community college associated degree in landscape
- Become a Certified Landscape Technician through the Oregon Landscape Contractors Association (OLCA)
- Get a 4-year college degree in landscape Architecture or design



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
