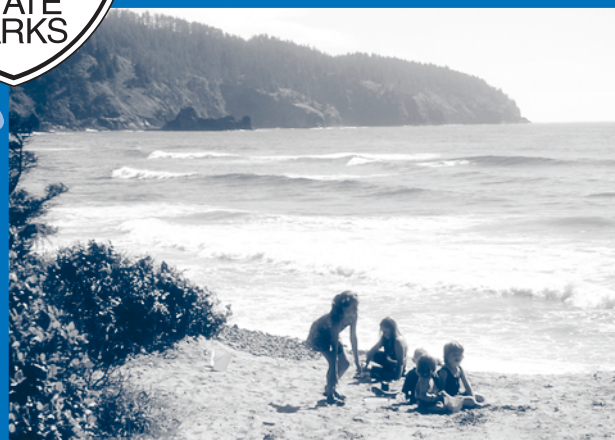




Cape Lookout CAMPGROUND



Nestled in a lush coastal forest on a sand spit between the Pacific Ocean and Netarts Bay, Cape Lookout State Park is a destination for sightseers, hikers, beachcombers and campers who appreciate a harmonious blend of nature and recreation.

Year-round Camping

- 38 full hookup sites* (sewer, electricity, water)
- 173 tent sites with water nearby
- 1 electrical site with water
- 13 yurts
- 3 log cabins (deluxe)
- Paved parking, picnic table, fire rings at all sites
- 4 group tent camping areas
- Hiker/biker camp
- Meeting hall
- Hot showers and flush toilets
- Firewood for sale
- RV dump station (near the entrance to the campground; please use to dump a full holding tank instead of a campsite connection)

*2 campsites (C35, C37) and four yurts are accessible to campers with disabilities.

From October 1–April 30, camping in an Oregon state park costs less. At Cape Lookout, save \$4 per night off summer rates on full, electrical and tent sites, and \$21 on a deluxe cabin.

Yurt and Cabin Comforts

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a yurt or deluxe log cabin. Yurts are domed tents with structural support, plywood floors, lockable doors, lights and heating, and beds with mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a fold-out couch sleeps two. Our three deluxe cabins, which also accommodate five campers, have refrigerators, microwave ovens, barbecue grills and bathrooms with showers. They are located next to the day-use area. All cabin and yurt sites have fire rings and picnic tables.

Day-Use Area Fees

Cape Lookout requires a day-use pass year-round. You'll need to display either a daily permit, a 12 or 24-month pass, an Oregon Pacific Coast Passport or your camping receipt on the driver side of your dashboard. Your camping receipt is equal to a daily permit for those days registered. You may purchase a \$3 daily permit from the yellow vending machine at the area's entrance. The 12-month (\$25) and 24-month (\$40) day-use passes are sold at G.I. Joe's stores throughout Oregon and at major state park offices.

Hiking Trails

The Cape Trail, a 2.4-mile trek to the tip of Cape Lookout, begins at the trailhead parking area 2.6 miles south of the park entrance on the Three Capes Scenic Route. The tip of the cape offers prime whale watching during Gray whale migrations.

The South Trail winds 1.8 miles from the cape trailhead to the beach south of the cape, and the **North Trail** extends 2.3 miles north to the park's day-use area.

You can follow a 1/4-mile, self-guided nature trail, beginning near the campground registration booth or the day-use area. Another short loop trail along Jackson Creek displays the park's fish habitat restoration efforts (begins off the park entrance road east of the RV dump station). Trail guides are available at the registration booth, or from a park host.

Three Capes Scenic Route

The northern end of this loop begins in Tillamook and winds along the shore of Tillamook Bay to Cape Lookout and two other capes with state parks. **Cape Meares State Scenic Viewpoint**, north of Cape Lookout, features an historic lighthouse, hiking trails, picnic areas and an unusually shaped Sitka Spruce known as the "Octopus Tree." The lighthouse is open daily,

April 1–October 31, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Watch for whales and offshore seabird nesting. To the south, **Oceanside Beach State Recreation Site** offers beach access north of Netarts Bay.

South of Cape Lookout, **Clay Myers State Natural Area** at Whalen Island is an ecological wonderland centered in the Sandlake Estuary and **Cape Kiwanda State Natural Area**, with its sculptured sandstoned cliffs, is a mecca for wave watching.

Pacific City, just south of the cape, is home to a dory fleet and is the location of **Bob Straub State Park**, which provides access to the broad, sandy beaches of Nestucca Spit.

Munson Creek Falls State Natural Site, off U.S. 101, six miles south of Tillamook, has a trail to the highest waterfall (319 feet) in the Coast mountain range.
