**Reserve early!** Reserve campsites and cabins two days to nine months in advance by phone, Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687), or online through [www.oregonstateparks.org](http://www.oregonstateparks.org).

**P**rineville Reservoir State Park has two campgrounds and two day-use areas with boat ramps on the shore of a high desert canyon lake near the center of the state. It is an ideal destination for year-round fishing and wildlife viewing, and for summertime stargazing.

### Main Campground

(Full hookup sites open year-round)

- 22 full hookup sites (sewer, electricity, water)
- 22 electrical sites with water
- 23 tent sites with water nearby
- 3 log cabins (deluxe)
- Paved parking, picnic table, fire ring at all sites
- Flush toilets and hot showers
- 32 boat moorages (summer only)
- Amphitheater for interpretive, evening programs

### Jasper Point Camping and Day-Use

(2.5 miles east of main campground; open May 1 – September 30; first-come, first-served)

- 30 electrical sites with water
- Flush toilets and hot showers
- Boat ramp
- RV dump station
- 1.75-mile lakeside hiking trail to main campground (easy to moderate hike)

### Universal Access

Campsites C10 and C11 are accessible to campers with disabilities in the main campground. Sites 6 and 8 are accessible at Jasper Point.

### Discovery Season

From October 1-April 30, camping in an Oregon state park costs less. At Prineville Reservoir's main campground, you save \$4 per night off summer rates on full hookup, electrical and tent sites.

### Enjoy Cabin Comforts

Three deluxe cabins overlook the reservoir. All are three-room structures (18-by-20 feet) with bathrooms and showers. They are furnished with beds (with mattresses) that sleep six. Amenities include microwave ovens, gas barbecues and refrigerators. Outside, you can relax on covered porches and enjoy spectacular scenery all year.

### A Haven for Water Sports

Waterskiing, swimming and boating are popular at Prineville Reservoir. See map for locations of boat ramps. A buoy-marked swimming area with a beach also serves day-use visitors near the main campground. A day-use picnic area and a fish-cleaning station are nearby, as is a fishing pier that is accessible to people with disabilities. The reservoir is an excellent place to catch trout, catfish, bass and black crappie.

Boat rentals, fuel, meals and supplies are available at the Prineville Reservoir Resort, three miles east of the park.

### Hunt for High Desert Treasures

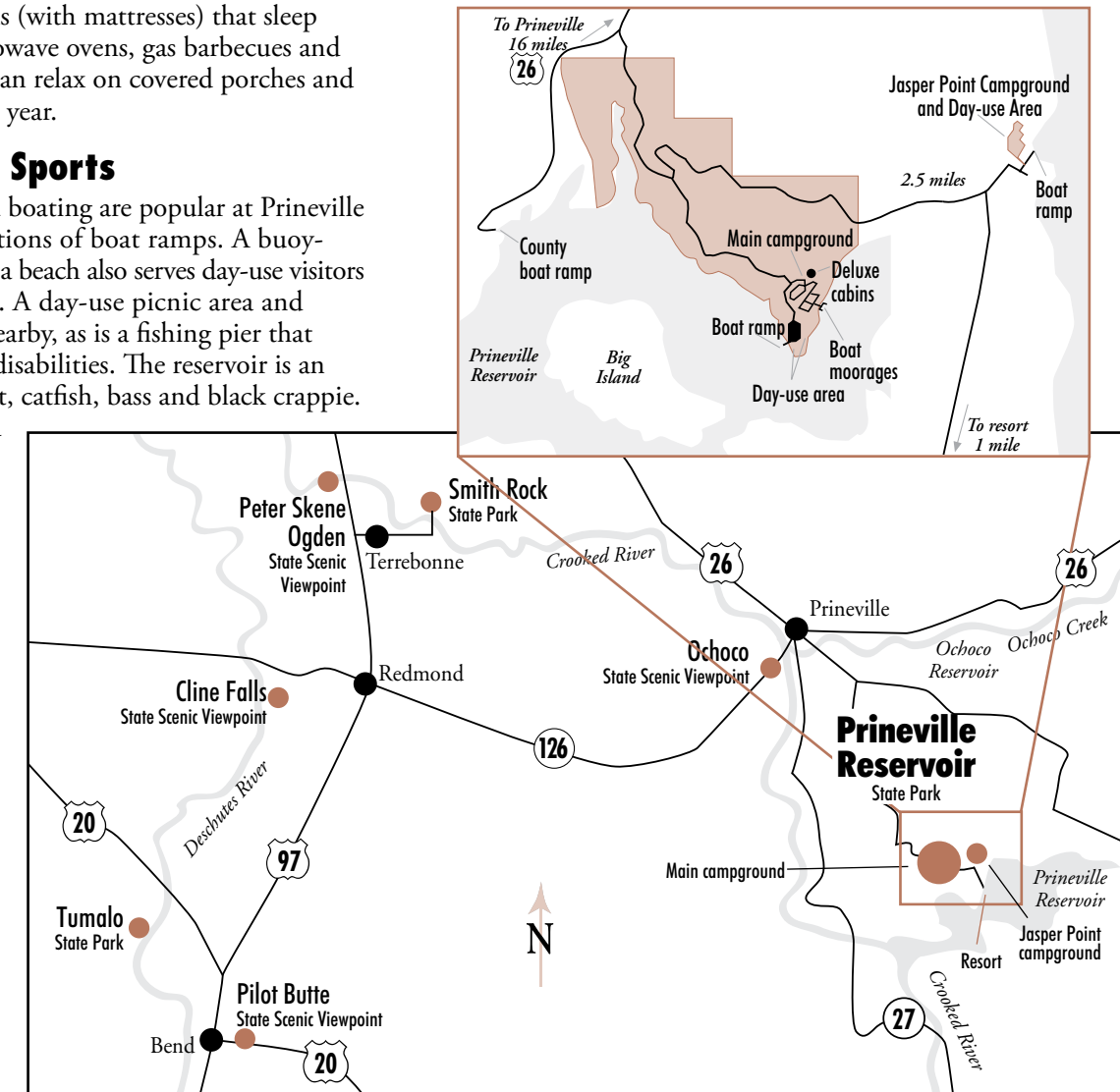
Rockhounds find many treasures in the Prineville area. Ask the Prineville Chamber of Commerce for information on areas set aside for rock collectors to dig.

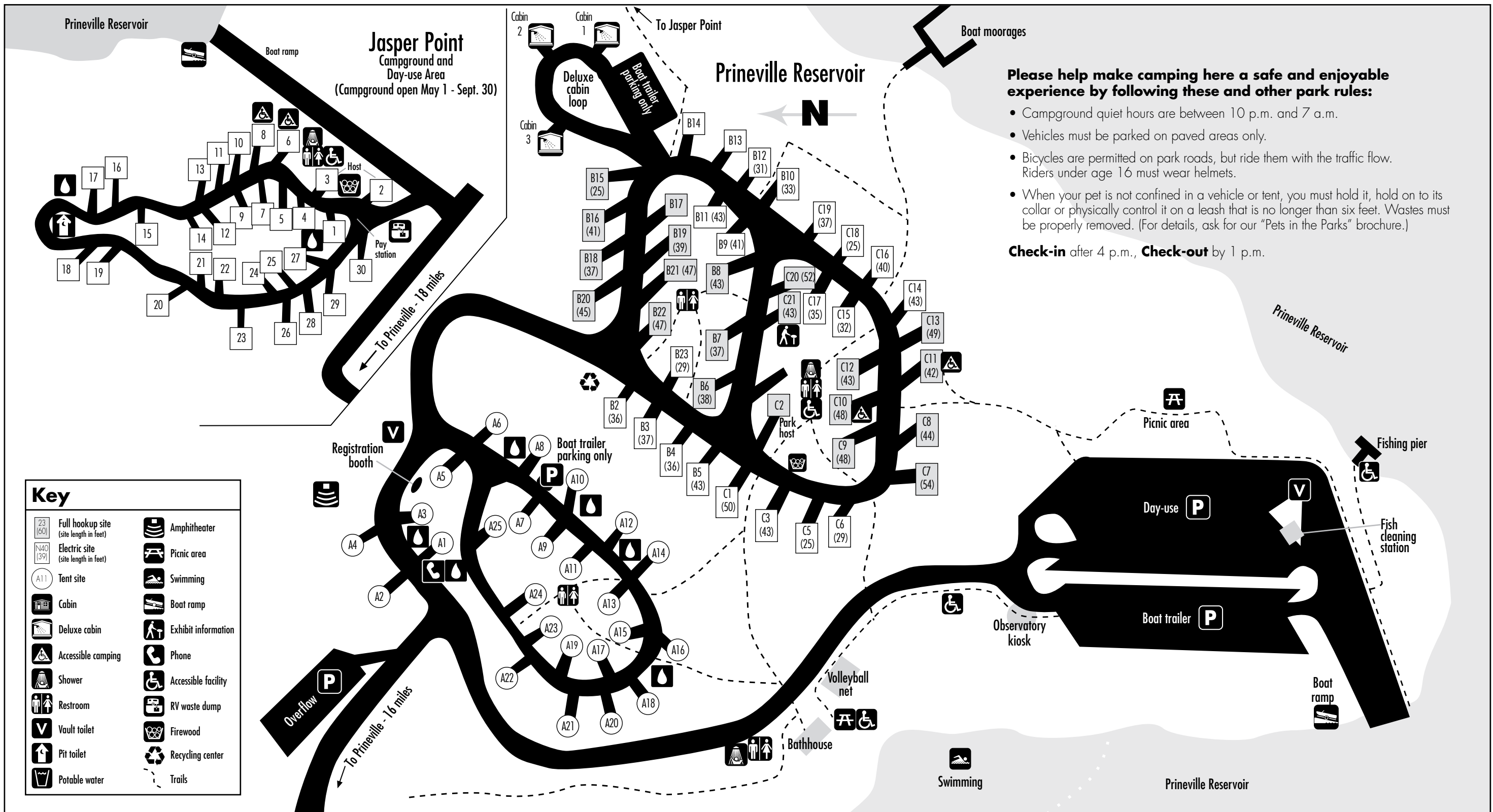

Popular finds include agates with dendrites, white plume agates, various colored moss agates, green jasper, jasper interlaced with agate, Ochoco chalcedony, thunder eggs and petrified wood.

Want to see a really big rock? Explore Steins Pillar, a geological landmark on Mill Creek Road, 15 miles northeast of Prineville.





**Please help make camping here a safe and enjoyable experience by following these and other park rules:**

- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- Vehicles must be parked on paved areas only.
- Bicycles are permitted on park roads, but ride them with the traffic flow. Riders under age 16 must wear helmets.
- When your pet is not confined in a vehicle or tent, you must hold it, hold on to its collar or physically control it on a leash that is no longer than six feet. Wastes must be properly removed. (For details, ask for our "Pets in the Parks" brochure.)
